

# Taking Palliative Care Online

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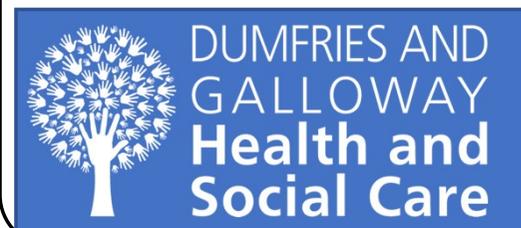

This will be a useful resource for those delivering and receiving palliative care.



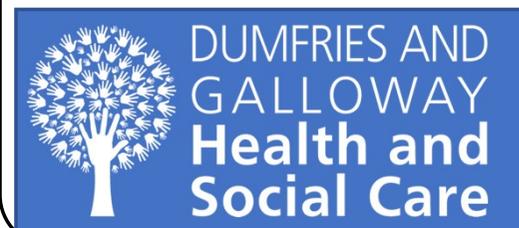
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## Aims and objectives

National palliative care guidelines for professionals are available online. There is also a wealth of resources for the public. It is also important that people can utilise local and national resources (including third sector) in an easily accessible way. Against this background a decision was made to create a local palliative care website.

- To create a website that is modern and up-to-date
- To make the specialist palliative care team roles known and referral pathways easily accessible to public and professionals
- To make local and national guidelines easily accessible
- To encouraging advance care planning conversations
- To provide educational resources for CPD
- To promote staff wellbeing
- To create a space for patients, relatives and friends to access information about palliative care and practical tips, with signposting to other useful resources
- To support “compassionate community” initiatives
- To increase people’s confidence in supporting people through terminal illness and bereavement.
- To highlight bereavement resources and signposting to third sector organisations

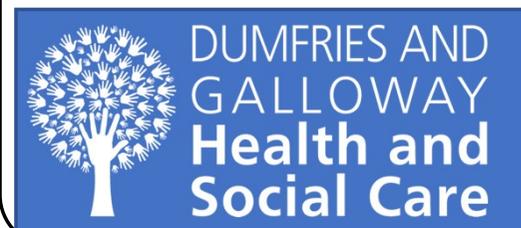


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## Methods

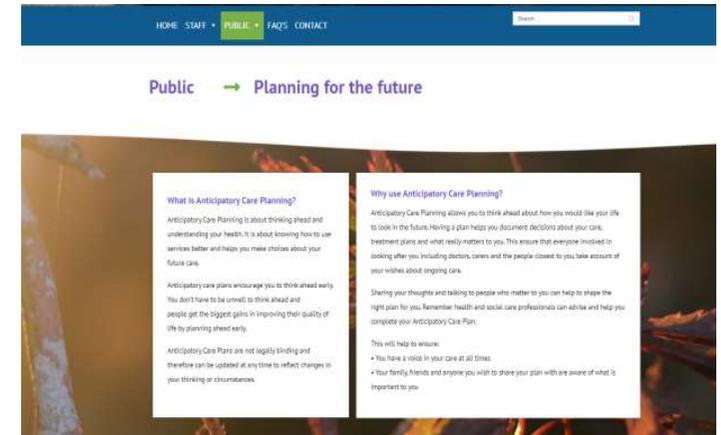
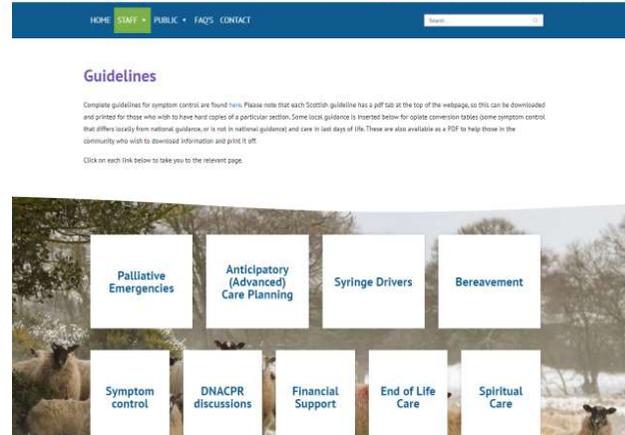


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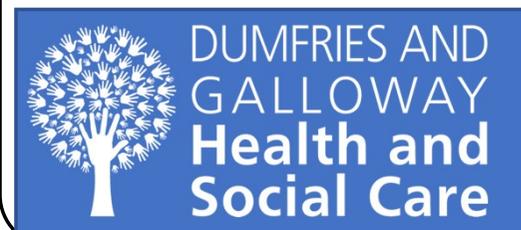
# Results
