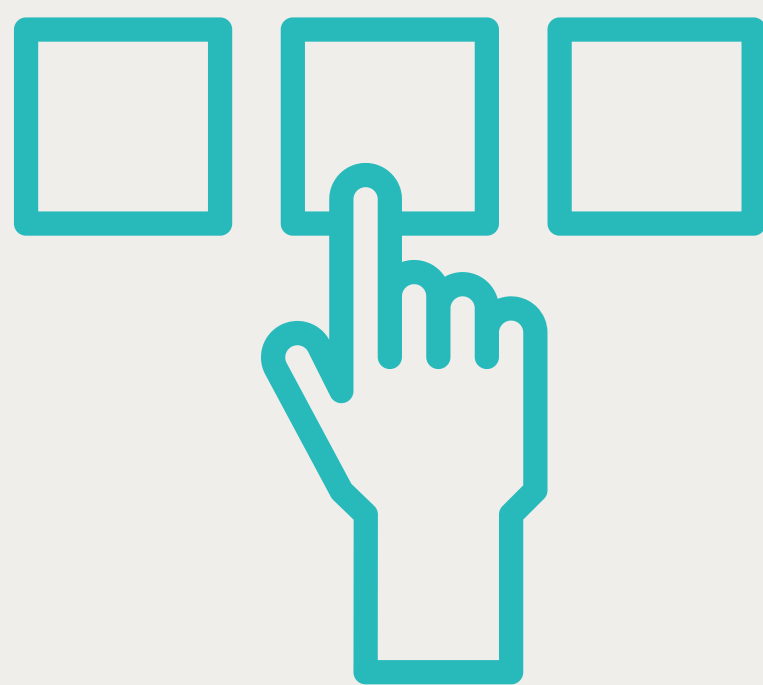
2) Key Aims of the Study Days

Nurses appreciate the range and relevance of the topics, and the opportunity to learn with and from nurses from other hospices.



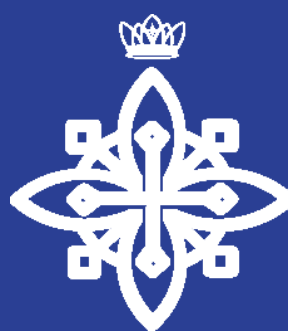
6) Conclusion
