## Realistic Conversations: Developing and delivering a toolkit for virtual communication training

Person-centred, effective communication is fundamental to all aspects of health and social care delivery. We designed and delivered one-hour, online communication training webinars for clinical staff engaging in Anticipatory Care Planning (ACP) and Shared Decision Making (SDM) conversations. In partnership with NHS Education for Scotland (NES), we launched a toolkit for clinical educators to use in their own training programmes.





## Previous work, challenge, and approach

- Communication education pre-pandemic delivered face-to-face and resource intensive.
- Transition to online platforms drove innovations in webinars for staff training.
- Effective teaching & learning in clinical communication uses blended approach of accessible theory and interactive training sessions.



Delivery Methods	Delivery Aims
Clinically relevant, simulated scenario for participants presented using an interactive demonstration teaching method. Faculty of experienced clinical tutors using structured teaching manuals.	<ul> <li>Participants engage actively in learning and develop enhanced communication competencies by-</li> <li>observing sections of the model interview.</li> <li>identifying helpful communication behaviours.</li> <li>considering impacts of communication behaviours on the patient/relative/staff member in role.</li> <li>suggesting next steps for the conversation.</li> </ul>
Memorable, evidence-based interview structures guide the conversation, support learning, and aid transfer to practice.	Tutors and participants access communication resources and good practice points for effective communication via downloadable handouts and linked online resources.

Anticipatory Care > Planning (REDMAP)	Talking with a person about 'what matters to you' and realistic options are key aspects of share- decision making discussions. Supporting professionals to discuss anticipatory care planning wi individuals and those close to them is similarly a priority.
